Its not a secret. 5,500 schoolchildren in Humboldt County qualify for a free or reduced school lunch.

Five days a week the school lunch, and, for some, the school breakfast and after school snacks provide their most dependable meals. Through no choice of their own, their families or guardians are living at or below the Federal poverty level.

Its not a secret that weekends present an unwelcome challenge for these children.

On weekends a working parent may not be able to prepare a nutritious meal if other expenses like gas, rent, insurance and medicine use up the cash between paychecks. A care giving grandparent may not have the resources to shop and prepare a meal. A single parent working two jobs won't always be home at mealtimes and siblings won't always provide smart choices.

Its not a secret that these local schoolchildren and our community suffer.

In the short term, returning to school after 55 hours of catch-as-catch-can meals can make Jack or Jane an irritable and anxious classmate. Over time, the weekend hunger cycle can lead to behavioral and psychological problems, poor physical and attention skills and an inability to focus and learn.

And for our community the consequences of childhood hunger affects the lives of every one of us as we struggle to encourage a generation of less fortunate children into productive citizenship.
