Hello, this is Duane Rigge with a Community Comment.

In my July Community Comment I reflected upon my new found freedom of becoming officially "retired" and the opportunities this offers to me as a recovering workaholic.

My wife and I used July to rediscover the many wonderful things there are to enjoy and see in California. We invited our 16-year old granddaughter to share this road touring adventure with us. Well, I am here to report that California is one of the most fantastic and geographically diverse locations on the planet earth, and it is here at our very doorstep to enjoy and explore. Even after driving over 4,000 miles of highways and back roads, we are looking forward to exploring more of the many natural wonders and history of California in the future.
